Dr. Woodland

We've been lucky to welcome some new faculty members

to our team this year as well as welcome back several returning members, but one person is noticeably missing, **DR. DON WOODLAND.** For those who don't know Dr. Woodland, he was named Executive Director of the school in 1968 and retired from the position in 2018. He served our school for FIFTY years... let that sink



in! This year marks the first session since 1967 that Dr. Woodland won't be present. The below excerpt is from a tribute written by Dr. Dave Kohl, Professor Emeritus, Virgina Tech following Dr. Woodland's retirement.

The Graduate School of Banking at LSU has been in existence since 1950 and is the largest venue for banker education. Dr. Don Woodland has been at the helm of this prestigious program for over half a century. Similar to the majestic clock tower and the live oak trees on the LSU campus, Dr. Woodland has become an institution and a legend that will stand the test of time.

Dr. Woodland's leadership guided the school through seven economic cycles and recessions, three wars, the 9/11 tragedy, and major hurricanes.

The evolution from pencil and paper and blackboards with chalk to the mainframe computer, then on to personal computers and email, and finally to iPads and everything mobile has resulted in change as the mode of operation for this stellar educational experience.

The woman who worked early security at the front desk of Pleasant Hall reported seeing Dr. Woodland regularly at 4:30AM to prepare for another day. Fast forward to student apartments and the faculty housing at Lod Cook, which seems like heaven in comparison to the early days.

Dr. Woodland, you are an inspiration to the student workers, staff, students, faculty, and members of the banking community. We thank you for your leadership in our educational journey of life.

HAUNTED HALLS

It's no secret that some of the buildings and dorms at LSU have been around for a little while. In fact, Highland Hall will have its 90th birthday this year! Whether you believe in ghosts or not, it's hard not to wonder if someone (or something) has stuck around in some of these buildings. As someone who lived in Acadian her freshman year of college, I can attest that I didn't always *feel* alone whenever it appeared that I was in the halls. While I don't think we've had any claims of paranormal activity from GSBLSU past and present students, the following excerpt from a Revelry article from 2003 might make you take an extra look over your shoulder while you're heading to your dorm tonight.

Tales of a Haunted Campus Kim Moreau, Revelry Writer Oct 30, 2003

Though some people may consider New Orleans a supernatural haven, LSU might have its share of ghosts as well. On a campus this old, there are bound to be stories of murders and mysteries that warrant retelling. Buildings get older and deteriorate, renovations occur; over the years, these buildings have housed many different facilities.

Evangeline Hall is one of the oldest residence halls on campus. And besides housing female students, the hall might be housing a few ghosts as well. Some students and resident advisors in Evangeline believe they have been in the presence of ghosts. Students have gone to great lengths to protect themselves, on one occasion having their rooms blessed by priests in attempts to exercise the negative spirits. Three specific ghosts are rumored to haunt Evangeline – a male janitor on the fifth floor and two girls on the fourth floor. Sightings have been mentioned on the second floor as well. The two girls

supposedly inhabit room 409, and the sound of their laughter often startles residents.

At another residence hall, the stories of ghosts are clearer to trace.

Acadian has housed students since it was built in the '30s. Acadian resident advisor Marilyn Fouche said according to legend, Acadian fell victim to fire years ago. At the time, many workers at Acadian were Spanish and spoke no English. Many of the workers did not survive. Students often claim to see people with wavy hair wandering around and disappearing around corners and through locked doorways. Men in navy suits with slick hair are said to walk around the corners late at night as well as girls in white dresses walking through hallways and looking out windows. Computers play games themselves and cabinet doors are mysteriously flung wide open. Acadian is not short on incidences of the unexplainable. Fouche said she has heard plenty of stories of the dorm being haunted. She said at one point over the summer, another RA was startled when a table began rocking violently in front of her with no possible explanation.

It seems Pleasant, Evangeline, and Acadian each house their own type of other-worldly residents and legends to keep students up at night.
